

12. The two boys who I had been talking to told me not to get out and they ran off. I could hear a noise and jumped out of the vehicle. I could see a crowd of people at Market Street on the opposite side of the road to us. There were approximately 60 people and they were all scattered and some were fighting in small groups. There was not one big fight but numerous fights going on. I saw people throwing punches but I did not know who they were. I could just see arms swinging but not exactly who was fighting.
13. I ran over to the island in the middle of the road and that is when I realised I did not have my radio. I did not see any injured persons at this stage. I ran back to the Land Rover and got out my hand held radio and called the control room in Portadown for assistance but nobody was answering so I used the Land Rover's radio. I thought my handheld radio wasn't working. The two radios were on separate channels but everyone can hear what I was saying including the control room. Our radio sign was Juliet Delta 81, however I initially used the call sign Juliet Delta 80 because I was nervous and scared.
14. At this stage there was nobody at the Land Rover and as I came around, I then saw two fellows lying on the ground. I had not seen these men earlier when I had got out of the Land Rover and gone over to the central reservation, so I radioed for assistance again and said, "*There's two persons down; we need an ambulance urgently*". The bodies were definitely not on the ground when I had first got out of the Land Rover.
15. One of the injured men was lying on Market Street and the other one was 5 or 6 feet below him. A photograph has been produced and shown to me containing page 222, which is a view looking from High Street in to Market Street. Woodhouse Street is on the right of the picture and Thomas Street is on the left of the photograph. Another photograph of the junction of Thomas Street and Market Street is produced and shown to me containing page 233. Looking at the photographs I can confirm the two men were lying in Market Street at the junction with Thomas Street. They were both on the road.
