19. I saw some other people that had come up from Woodhouse Street just milling about. At page 7792 I am said to have told police that I "*only observed approximately 10 or 12 person running around.*" I must have remembered at the time but now I can't say, "Yes, I can remember 10 people," or not. I did not recognise any of the people that I saw.
20. I do recall a heavy set man in a blue shirt with ginger hair being pushed away from the scene by another man who seemed to be trying to keep the peace. He was shouting what sounded like anti-Protestant abuse and phrases like "*up at us*" or "*I hope youse are happy now*" or words to that effect. He appeared to be shouting at the police and shouted up towards Jameson's when he said "*I hope youse are happy now*". May be he thought that what had happened was a result of people coming out of the bar which was not the case. That is only my opinion of why he appeared to be shouting in our direction.
21. When the ambulance arrived it was around the corner so I did not see it but I did see the paramedics attend the injured men. I did not stay long as there was nothing to be done, the police were on the scene and the ambulancemen had come. The injured had been taken away and the street was cleared when we went back inside.
22. The next day I heard on the news that it had been an attack by a Loyalist mob. That was news to me. I did not understand it because I did not see a Loyalist mob but then I did not see the attack so I do not know the true position.
23. I did discuss the incident with the other bar staff and we were asking ourselves what actually happened. I didn't get any more details from those conversations As I say, it was not until I heard on the news that there had been an attack by a Loyalist mob that I knew what had gone on. I did not see any violence.
